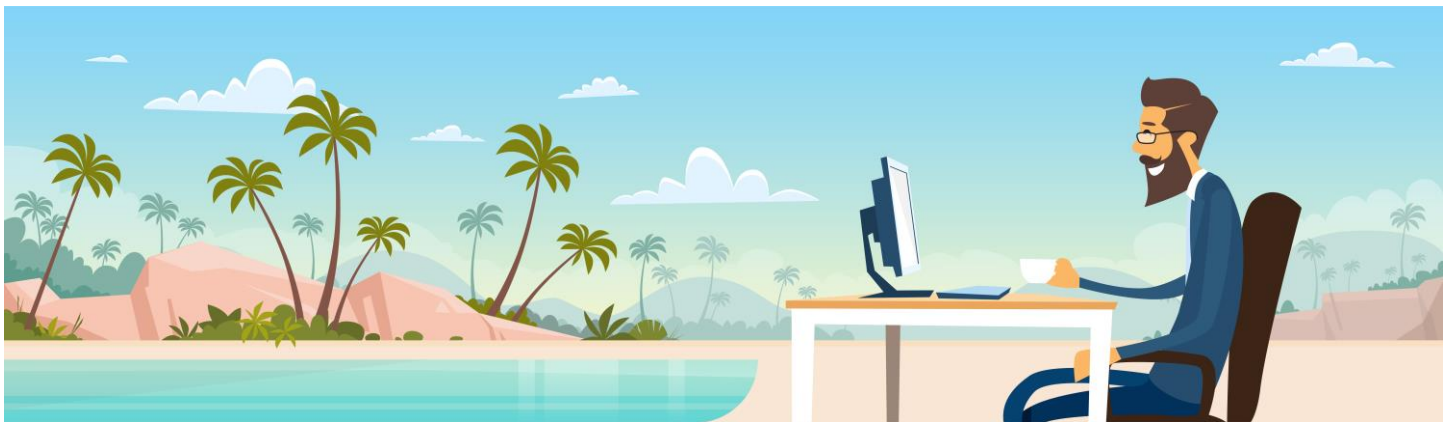
1. Why Start a Working Holiday

Of course, it always makes sense and eventful to take a break - whether after school, during your studies or before entering the job market. So you can get to know the country and culture much more intensively. In addition, you have the opportunity to reflect on your views and worldviews, learn, adapt, and automatically become aware of your own culture and background. It trains the so-called typical soft skills, many of which include: foreign language skills, perseverance, cosmopolitanism, intercultural understanding, country-specific know-how, tolerance, flexibility, adaptability, organizational skills and of course the ability to be independent and communicative. In particular, "work and travel" is characterized by the fact that you can finance the journey through jobs and thus seize the opportunity to become independent through the wage: you can travel a lot and long. But it also brings with it the awareness to work just for it and maybe for the first time to experience the feeling of self-financing really **fundamentally**.

Of course, the uncertainty about what is going to happen in the next few weeks, or where to stay with whom, is as much a part of it as the need to save and give up sometimes and can create great serenity in the future.

If you work in the workplace, you will meet many interesting people, make contacts and gain work experience, experience the country-specific work routine and do activities that you might not otherwise do.

It is a unique sense of freedom that can give work and travel. It's usually in a long way from home, and probably for the first time. They come in hostels, privately or on farms, meet a lot of other backpackers, with whom you can exchange valuable experiences and anecdotes, get to know countrymen and rent or buy your own vehicle, to spontaneously go somewhere and spend the night. And back to the home country: A **working holiday** can be sold well in the **CV!**

- **Working Holiday** / Work & Travel = Work and Travel Program provides foreign students with an opportunity to live and work in another country.

- **CV** = Curriculum Vitae is a document similar to a resume where you list your past educational and work experience and your job qualifications.

- **fundamentally** = fundamental (adjective)

- Soft skills are the personal attributes, personality traits, inherent social cues, and **communication abilities** needed for success on the job. Soft skills characterize how a person interacts in his or her relationships with others.

“The company required a soft skill from the applicants, which meant they would have to be good at communication, or some other interpersonal thing.”
